Naracoorte Community Garden

FEES AND PLOTS

- ➤ Gardeners can officially garden at the *Naracoorte Community Garden* after reading and signing this agreement.
- ➤ Gardeners agree to pay \$55.00 annually (including GST) to the Naracoorte Lucindale Council per plot beginning on July 1st each financial year.
- ➤ Payments not made by October 1st will result in the plot being relinquished.

 The annual fee subsidises the costs associated with the Community Garden.

ASSIGNING PLOTS

- Garden plots are assigned to one person and are not transferable. Others may garden at your site, but fees and other duties are the responsibility of the individual whose name is assigned to the plot.
- A waiting list will be maintained where applicable and plots assigned from the waiting list as they become available.

PLOT MAINTENANCE & EXPECTATIONS

- Gardeners must maintain plots and the surrounding area.
- Plots which are not maintained may be reassigned.
- > Allotments are not to be fenced.
- If, for any reason, you will be temporarily unable to maintain your plot, inform Council.

GARDENERS, FAMILY AND PETS

- In the spirit of cooperation, all gardeners will treat the garden, other gardeners, neighbours, and visitors with respect and consideration.
- ➤ Harvesting (stealing) from others' plots without authorization will not be tolerated and may result in expulsion from the garden.
- > Children are welcome at the garden, when accompanied and fully supervised by an adult.
- Pets are not permitted in the Community Garden enclosure.
- The last gardener to leave the garden is responsible for locking the gate.

OTHER USEFUL INFORMATION

- The Community Garden is managed (as near as possible) according to the principles of organic gardening.
- In accordance with best practice community gardening, we use water conservatively so as to minimise its consumption.
- We use compost as a garden fertiliser to provide our plants with the nutrients they need to grow strong and healthy and to improve the moisture retention capacity of our garden soils.
- In addition to vegetables and herbs, community gardeners may grow plants of their choice, including flowers, that are agreeable to the Community Garden membership.
- Climbing plants such as beans and tomato are best grown on a trellis no higher than two metres so as not to cast shade on neighbouring plots.
- Taller fruit trees, trees and shrubs are not to be grown in the plots.
- A shed is supplied for storing materials. Stack and store materials neatly so that they are easily accessible and out of the way of paths and places where people walk.
